About Lake Dalrymple

Preventing invasive species is essential to maintaining Lake Dalrymple's health and biodiversity. These species outcompete native wildlife, disrupt ecosystems, and are nearly impossible to remove once established. By cleaning boats and equipment, avoiding the transfer of fish and plants, and raising awareness about invasive species, we can protect the lake's ecological balance and ensure its sustainability for future generations.

Eurasian Watermilfoil (Eurasia and Africa)
Rusty Crayfish (East-Central United States)
Starry Stonewort (Europe and Western Asia)
Zebra Mussel (Eurasia)
Quagga Mussel (Eurasia)

Lake Dalrymple is a popular fishing, boating, and shoreline living destination. Invasive species can 'hitch-aride' on people and their equipment as they travel back and forth to the lake.

Once they are established, they are nearly impossible to eradicate, therefore prevention is key.

Prevention Best Practices

- 1. CLEAN, DRAIN, and DRY all watercraft, trailers, motors, and gear every time, everywhere.
- 2. **NEVER** release or move fish, animals, or plants from one waterbody to another.
- 3. **LEARN** to recognize and report aquatic invasive species.
- INFORM others about the threat of aquatic invasive species.
